MADAM PRESIDENT:

I offer the following resolution and move its adoption:

1	A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the Legislative Council
2	to assign the Interim Committee on Agriculture the task of
3	studying the legalization of growing industrial hemp.
4	Whereas, Industrial hemp is one of the world's oldest
5	crops, and can be used to produce a variety of goods,
6	including paper, clothing, food, cosmetics, plastic, fuel, oil,
7	and medicine;
8	Whereas, Industrial hemp differs from recreational and
9	medicinal hemp in that it contains less than 0.3% of the

medicinal hemp in that it contains less than 0.3% of the psychoactive ingredient tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), while recreational and medicinal hemp contains between 2% and 20% THC in order to produce physical and psychological effects;

Whereas, Although the cultivation and sale of hemp was made ostensibly illegal by the Marijuana Tax Act of 1937, Jasper County grew hemp used to create uniforms, canvases, ropes, and other supplies for the military during World War II, and even received an award from the United States Department of Agriculture for its efforts;

1	Whereas, Industrial hemp is not illegal to possess, but it
2	is illegal to grow. Many American-owned businesses lose
3	money importing their hemp products to the United States
4	from over 30 other countries; and
5	Whereas, Colorado, Maine, Montana, North Dakota,
6	Oregon, Vermont, Washington, and West Virginia have
7	defined industrial hemp as distinct from recreational and
8	medicinal marijuana, and removed barriers to its production.
9	Hawaii, Kentucky, and Maryland have passed bills creating
10	commissions or authorizing research regarding industrial
11	hemp. Arkansas, Maine, Minnesota, New Mexico, North
12	Carolina, and Vermont have passed hemp study bills.
13	California, Colorado, Illinois, Montana, New Hampshire,
14	New Mexico, North Dakota, Vermont, and Virginia have
15	passed hemp resolutions: Therefore,
16	Be it resolved by the Senate of the
17	General Assembly of the State of Indiana:
18	SECTION 1. The Legislative Council is urged to assign the Interim
19	Committee on Agriculture the task of studying the legalization of
20	growing industrial hemp.
