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11	TO CREATE A COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE BENEFICIAL
12	USES OF INDUSTRIAL HEMP, TO PROVIDE FOR THE
12	STUDY COMMITTEE'S MEMBERSHIP, AND TO REQUIRE
14	THAT THE STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT ITS FINDINGS
14	AND RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
16	BEFORE JANUARY 15, 2008, AT WHICH TIME THE STUDY COMMITTEE IS ABOLISHED.
17	COMMITTEE IS ABOLISHED.
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19	Whereas, hemp is cannabis grown specifically for industrial use
20	and contains very low levels of cannabinoids (THC). Thus, grown
21	properly it has virtually no intoxicating effects when consumed;
22	and
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24	Whereas, because hemp has a relatively short growth cycle of one
25	hundred twenty days, it is an efficient and economical crop for
26	farmers to grow; and
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28	Whereas, a variety of useful materials can be made from hemp
29	such as paper, textiles, building materials, food, medicine, paint,
30	detergent, varnish, oil, ink, and fuel; and

32	Whereas, for these and other reasons, it is fitting for the General
33	Assembly to study the beneficial uses of industrial hemp. Now,
34	therefore,
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36	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South
37	Carolina:

39	SECTION 1. (A) There is created a committee to study the
40	beneficial uses of industrial hemp. The committee shall:
40	(1) study the many beneficial uses of industrial hemp
42	including, but not limited to, the use of industrial hemp oil as an

alternative fuel and the use of industrial hemp fiber in construction
and paper products;

3 (2) examine the economic opportunities industrial hemp 4 provides to the State;

5 (3) consider the desirability and feasibility of pursuing 6 authorization of the cultivation and production of industrial hemp 7 as a farm product in the State;

8 (4) review current scientific and business literature on the 9 many uses of industrial hemp as an alternative fuel and motor oil, 10 the uses of omega-3 rich industrial hemp seed and industrial hemp 11 oil in snack foods, body care products, and food supplements; the 12 uses of industrial hemp fibers as raw materials for construction and 13 paper products and for fabric; and the uses of industrial hemp in 14 the manufacture of recyclable car parts;

15 (5) review scientific literature on the different types of hemp 16 and how industrial hemp differs from hemp that is the illegal 17 substance marijuana;

18 (6) review current economic literature on the economic19 benefits of, and the economic markets for, the products made using20 industrial hemp;

21 (7) review actions taken by the federal government and 22 actions by other states to produce industrial hemp for industrial 23 uses;

24 (8) evaluate the economic opportunities for the State that 25 may result from the production of industrial hemp as a farm 26 product and manufacture of industrial hemp products; and

27 (9) other issues the committee deems relevant.

28 (B) The committee is composed of the following members:

(1) two members of the Senate appointed by the President30 Pro Tempore of the Senate;

31 (2) two members of the House of Representatives appointed32 by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;

33 (3) two members appointed by the Governor;

34 (4) the chairman of the House Agriculture, Natural

35 Resources, and Environmental Affairs Committee or his designee;

36 (5) the chairman of the Senate Agriculture and Natural37 Resources Committee or his designee;

38 (6) the Commissioner of Agriculture or his designee;

39 (7) the director of the Department of Commerce or his40 designee;

41 (8) the president of the South Carolina Farm Bureau 42 Federation or his designee;

43 (9) the dean of Clemson University or his designee; and

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1 (10) the dean of the University of South Carolina or his 2 designee.

3 (C) The members of the committee shall serve until their 4 successors are appointed and qualify or the committee is dissolved. 5 Vacancies on the committee must be filled in the manner of the 6 original appointment and for the remainder of the unexpired term. 7 The members of the committee shall appoint a chairman and vice 8 chairman.

9 (D) The staffing for the committee must be provided by the 10 appropriate committees of the Senate and House of 11 Representatives at the discretion of the President Pro Tempore and 12 the Speaker of the House of Representatives, respectively.

13 (E) The committee, in the discharge of its duties, is authorized 14 to issue subpoenas and subpoenas duces tecum, to compel the 15 attendance of witnesses and production of documents, books, 16 papers, correspondence, memoranda, and other relevant records to 17 its study.

18 (F) Members of the committee may receive per diem, 19 subsistence, and mileage as provided by law for members of state 20 boards, committees, and commissions to be paid from the 21 approved accounts of the entity of the public official who 22 appointed the member.

23 (G) The committee must render its report and recommendations

24 to the General Assembly before January 15, 2008, at which time it 25 is dissolved.

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27 SECTION 2. This joint resolution takes effect upon approval by 28 the Governor.

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
