10	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
11	SECTION 1. The Study Commission to Study the Industrial Uses of
12	Industrial Hemp is created to study the many beneficial industrial uses of industrial
13	hemp, including the use of industrial hemp oil as an alternative fuel and the use of
14	industrial hemp fiber in construction and paper products; to study the economic
15	opportunities industrial hemp provides to the State; and to consider the desirability and
16	feasibility of authorizing industrial hemp cultivation and production as a farm product in
17	North Carolina. This Study Commission shall consist of fifteen members as follows:
18	(1) Two appointed by the Governor.
19	(2) Two appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
20	(3) Two appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
21	(4) The chairman of the House Agriculture Committee.
22	(5) The chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee.
23	(6) The Commissioner of Agriculture or the Commissioner's designee.
24	(7) The President of the North Carolina Farm Bureau Federation, Inc., or
25	the President's designee.
26	(8) The Secretary of Commerce or the Secretary's designee.

1 2 3 4	 f. Any other issues the Commission determines are pertinent. (2) The Commission shall develop findings and recommendations, including any legislative proposals it determines to be appropriate, for consideration by the General Assembly.
5	SECTION 6. Expenses of Members. – Members of the Commission shall
6	receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1,
7	138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.
8	SECTION 7. Staff. – Upon the prior approval of the Legislative Services
9	Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to the
10	Commission to aid in its work.
11	SECTION 8. Consultants. – The Commission may hire consultants to assist
12	with the study as provided in G.S. 120-32.02(b).
13	SECTION 9. Meetings. – The Commission may meet in the Legislative
14	Building or the Legislative Office Building upon the approval of the Legislative
15	Services Commission.
16	SECTION 10. Report. – The Commission shall report its findings and
17	recommendations to the General Assembly and the Environmental Review Commission
18	on or before 1 December 2006, at which time the Commission shall terminate.
19	SECTION 11. Funding. – There is appropriated from the General Fund to
20	the General Assembly the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the 2006-2007
21	fiscal year for the purpose of conducting the study provided for in this act.
22	SECTION 12. Effective Date. – This act becomes effective July 1, 2006.
